"For some time, the Phipps family has been interested in parks and recreation facilities for the Palm Beach County public. Several years ago, they donated Phipps Park to the City of West Palm Beach and a playground has been made available in Palm Beach. While these areas, they hope, have been helpful in providing recreation facilities of a certain type, they have not filled the greatest need in the community of this character, namely the need for adequate public beaches.

As the community develops, suitable areas sufficient in size become less and less available for public beach purposes. They have concluded that unless a public beach on the ocean is established now, it may not be possible to do later.

Because of this interest and concern, they announce that they are making a gift to the people of Palm Beach County, in an amount sufficient to purchase 1,200 feet of ocean to lake property..."

IN LESS THAN TWO YEARS, THE PRESERVATION FOUNDATION WILL BE DELIGHTED TO WELCOME THE RESIDENTS OF PALM BEACH TO THE GRAND OPENING OF PHIPPS OCEAN PARK.

Together, we will celebrate the transformation of this long-underutilized space into an extraordinary public landscape that fully realizes the Phipps family's vision for their 1948 gift: a beautiful public beach and oceanfront park where people can play, learn, and celebrate the unique scenic quality of Palm Beach.

A key component of this project will be the relocation of the Little Red Schoolhouse, Southeast Florida's first schoolhouse and the oldest landmark in Palm Beach, to a higher elevation by the dune, where it will be protected from frequent flooding and high winds. This relocation will ensure that the schoolchildren of Palm Beach County have continuous access to the Preservation Foundation's living history program, which takes fourth graders back in time to receive an 1890s education for a day and experience what it would have been like to study in a one-room wooden schoolhouse.

The Schoolhouse will be adjacent to the brand-new Coastal Restoration Center, a nursery and propagation facility for native plants that will support healthy beach dune ecosystems within the park and throughout the town.

Nearby, a playground designed by Danish innovator MONSTRUM will draw from the natural history of the site and invite children to learn about the island's native flora and fauna through elaborate, enormous play structures. These educational structures will be among the first completed components in the Preservation Foundation's extensive plans for re-creating and revitalizing Phipps Ocean Park—a gift 80 years in the making and a fitting continuation of the Preservation Foundation's long legacy of town-serving projects.



CIVIC SUPPORT

The Town of Palm Beach and State of Florida have earmarked funds for Phipps Ocean Park as part of their FY2024 budgets.

The Town Council approved a \$2 million contribution towards infrastructure-related improvements at the park. These funds will support new security features such as perimeter walls, parking lot lighting, entry gates, and a camera system monitored by the Town of Palm Beach Police Department. Additionally, the Town will invest an estimated \$625,000 annually for maintenance and security for the park.

The State of Florida's Division of Historical Resources awarded the Preservation Foundation of Palm Beach a Special Category Historic Preservation Grant in the amount of \$442,195 to support the Preservation Foundation of Palm Beach's relocation of the Little Red Schoolhouse. The grant will also be used to increase the resiliency of and rehabilitate Palm Beach's oldest landmark.

OVERVIEW

The revitalized Phipps Ocean Park will immerse visitors in a landscape of native Florida plants and numerous recreational areas, teach new generations to understand the past, and encourage the Palm Beach community to protect the places that make our town special.

It will exemplify all of the values embodied in the Preservation Foundation of Palm Beach's tagline: "Knowledge. Stewardship. Culture."

OVERVIEW

"The Little Red Schoolhouse and Phipps Ocean Park as a whole are both emblematic of the Preservation Foundation's dedication to preserving the architectural and cultural sites that make Palm Beach special.

The next chapter for the Schoolhouse and Phipps will marry two approaches to coastal resilience: avoiding flooding by seeking higher ground and establishing a resilient coastline by introducing indigenous plant life through all 20 acres of the park. This kind of work constitutes a lot of the Foundation's preservation effort; we think of our architectural heritage in holistic terms, and in order to protect the structures that represent our history, we can't view them as separate from the environment in which they exist."

LITTLE RED SCHOOLHOUSE

A confluence point for all visitors of the park to learn about Palm Beach's pioneer history

- Restored and relocated historic 1886 one-room schoolhouse
- Expanded educational programming for residents
- Currently serves 4,000 students annually through an experiential living history program
- New Schoolyard garden created in collaboration with the Garden Club of Palm Beach

OUTDOOR CLASSROOM

A new feature strategically located between the Main Access Plaza and the Schoolhouse provides an education space that is immersed in nature

- Main open space for activities, with native stone used to create seating elements
- Seating for 30 to 40 students, with 1,000 square feet of open space
- Creates an area for students to transition from school transportation and connect with the local habitat


ENHANCING KNOWLEDGE



COASTAL RESTORATION CENTER

Amid a thicket of trees and coastal strand vegetation, the nursery/propagation facility teaches children and adults about environmental advocacy through hands-on activities that restore native coastal ecosystems in the park and throughout the island

- 12,400 square feet dedicated to growing native species for the park and Town of Palm Beach
- Educational panels interpreting the local ecosystems
- New educational programs for K–12 students
- Allows visitors to learn by experiencing and interacting with historical ecosystems





GREAT LAWN

Open space that accommodates groups of all sizes for community programming and recreational activities

- 19,450 square feet
- Connects the Little Red Schoolhouse with the Wildflower Garden
- Passive green space that creates a gracious recreational facility and offers sight lines to the Little Red Schoolhouse from across the park



WILDFLOWER GARDEN

A transformative space at the entrance to the park with the mission of receiving rainwater from nearby green spaces; the Wildflower Garden serves as a model for restoration, adaptation, and resiliency

- 13,000 square feet
- Located in the park's natural basin, which provides moisture for plants to survive without irrigation
- Planted with native wildflowers and grasses that change based on the wet or dry season
- Gravel path allows visitors to explore the Wildflower Garden without disturbing the habitat



DUNE & MANGROVE RESTORATION

To the east, the dune protects the park from the ocean, while to the west, the mangroves provide protection and shelter from the Intracoastal Waterway

- Removal of invasive species to improve the health of both coasts, thereby increasing the natural habitat for coastal wildlife
- Opportunities for visitors to learn about the benefits of dune and mangrove restoration

RAIN GARDENS

Creating a model for localized flood control, permeable parking areas and rain gardens filter and mitigate stormwater runoff

- 18,000-square-foot parking lots that are integrated into the design of the park
- First public parking lot in Palm Beach to use solely permeable pavers



CELEBRATING PALM BEACH



HORIZON PLATEAU

Rising to the dune elevation, the Horizon Plateau provides panoramic views of the ocean and the different ecosystems in the park, along with open and sheltered places for gathering

- 19,000 square feet
- New picnic terraces overlooking the Atlantic
- Public art sculpture will be surrounded by legacy trees
- Elevation at the top of the dune provides views of the diverse landscapes throughout the park



DUNE PLAYGROUND

Stepping down from the Dune Crest Path, the Dune Playground offers an interpretive experience that uses vegetation and topography as play features

- 5,000 square feet providing two play areas: one for elementary schoolchildren and one for preschoolers
- A bespoke playground made from sustainable materials
- Using local ecosystems as inspiration, the design will stimulate children's imaginations, offer physical challenge and beneficial risk, and foster social interaction and creative play

ENTRANCE PLAZA


A legacy strangler fig tree marks the pedestrian entryway, the place where all trails and paths meet

- 4,074-square-foot access point that connects the Coastal Restoration Center, Dune Playground, Outdoor Classroom, Dune Crest Path, and Little Red Schoolhouse
- A large gathering space featuring shade, seating, and wayfinding signage creates the opportunity for both education and play
- Two natural water features invite visitors through to the Dune Crest Path

NEW FACILITIES

Enhance the usefulness of the park with new features

- Two new restroom facilities
- Picnic terraces
- Beach pavilions
- Lifeguard stand
- Pickleball courts near tennis center
- Updated beach paths with improved ADA accessibility






LOOKING FORWARD
